## **The Willis-Fleming Memorial**

On a grassy knoll above Havenstreet this classy building dominates the

local landscape. It is easily accessed by way of a public footpath but few seem to take advantage of the stunning views presented by the site. The climb is well worth while and for the curious, the interesting story of the building unfolds.



The Fleming family have long been associated with the

Island. Thomas Fleming who was the son of a Newport wool merchant, rose in spectacular fashion to be Lord Chief Justice in 1650. He presided at the trial of Guy Fawkes. His descendants owned large estates in the Ryde area and on the mainland. Not many men have the distinction of having a pub named after them but he has two, The Fleming Arms in Binstead and another of the same name in Swaythling. The Binstead Inn not only bears the Fleming name, but its inn sign sports the Willis-Fleming coat of arms.

The inscriptions on the memorial pay tribute to the men of Binstead and Havensteet who gave their lives in the Great War. Mention in particular is

made of Lieutenant Richard I Willis-Fleming who was killed defending the Suez canal from Turkish forces. He died on the day after his twentieth birthday on 4th August 1916. The courtyard of the shrine also contains memorial tablets to other members of the Willis-Fleming Rob Marshall family.

Readers of **Wightwash** will remember the battle fought by locals, councillors and CAMRA to get the Sun reopened and it is so encouraging to know that the pub has its future guaranteed.

Congratulations to **Paul Moreton** who has recently taken the helm at **Harvey's** in Newport, formerly called **The Vine.** Paul, who also runs the **Mai Thai Restaurant** 20 yards away tells me that although he has no plans for Real Ale at the moment, he may well (if enough of us grovel) stock it in the future.

Chris and Kate Cole must be heaving a sigh of relief now that the alterations have been completed to the Sun at Hulverstone. Within hours of the completion, the Sun played host to a wedding party with nearly 100 guests. A few days later it saw its first Beer Festival featuring 25 real ales and cider with even a bus load of

Wightwash can reveal that work is soon to start on the Horse and Groom at Ningwood.

The start date to return the pub to its former

glory will be at the beginning of October, finishing in time for a pre-Christmas opening.

Work will include the unblocking of the windows at the front, moving the bar back to its former position, and opening a side entrance so that customers, including wheelchair users, can gain access from the car park.





The news from an extremely busy Yates' Brewery is that for the first time in 5 years of brewing, they ran out of beer! David Snr. tells **Wightwash** that he has added a new permanent beer to his stock -Yates' Blonde 4.5% a light and very hoppy ale brewed with Fuggles hops, available at the Inn at St Lawrence, the White Lion. Niton and various other Island pubs. Thanks to an exchange deal that David has pulled off with Crouch Vale Breweries, you will be able to find "Brewers Gold" the Champion Beer of Britain in Isle of Wight pubs. The tiny Essex brewery can only produce 60 barrels of beer a week so they have been very selective with their outlets and in fact, have been unable to supply any new wholesalers. David's deal means that in

### **How They Ran the First Fox in the Wight**

Passon Fenwick o' Brook a kep' a darg vox On a chain i' his yard at the rear; Where a got en, an' how, I niver yet heerd, All thet I knows—he wuz theer.

To Passon cum hrunnin' one vine zummer day. As a moistedned a's clay on the laan, A's zervant man Zam we' the ter'ble news -'Pleaze zur, measter Reynolds be gaan.

Last they 'greed wor to gether an' dresh en out vair. Zo us met at the "Dragon" an' dined-Varmer Day, Zquire Thetcher an' Jemmy Scovell, An' a mort more bezaide I doan't mind

Zaays Zquire, a zetten oop top I' the cheer, As a's knife on the table a knocks, -"My hounds they'm be stoutish at hrunning a hare, I hreckon they'll zhow to a vox.

The story of the chase unfolds with references to Chillerton, Atherfield, Kingston and many other Island places. The fox, of course gets his up and commence and the day finishes with a celebratory dinner with "Zherry an' poort " and "prime old October brewed ale". Here's the last verse:

> Charge your glasses—no 'heel taps' we make it our boast; In the health I'm proposing to-night— Squire Thatcher of Wackland, I give as the toast, Who ran the first fox in the Wight.

After a long search, I eventually found a copy of Songs of the Soil in the County Reference Library in Newport.

I would be very interested to hear from anyone who could supply the tunes for these songs as the book only contains lyrics.

If you have a copy of Songs of the Soil, look after it. It is VERY, VERY RARE!

On to Mallaig where another ferry will transport you to Skye and another new brewery! If you only visit one pub on Skye make sure it's The Sligachan. Set at the head of a sea loch and with the 12 Munros of the Cuillins as neighbours it has a spectacular setting. Known locally as The Sliggy, it's a great pub with a good selection of ales, and now a brewery as well!

The Cuillin Brewery nestles between the hotel and the bar: the brewer is Eric Jones, originally from Bolton but more recently brewing for the now rival Isle of Skye Brewery over on the island's west coast.

Cuillins current brews are "Eagle Bitter" at 3.9%, a light aromatic drink, and "Skye Bitter" 4.1%. This is darker, smooth and malty. Bottling is done by the Hebridean Brewery in

Stornaway (whose "Hebridean Clansman" was also available at The Sliggy).

Good beers, good pubs and marvellous scenery. But if you're thinking of going next year, stub your fag out before you leave. There will be a total smoking ban beyond Carlisle from Barry and Mo March 2006.

ied ale that was last brewed in the early 70's. The **Youngs** brewers decided to look out the old recipe and resurrect this once popular ale. Youngs Special London Ale 6.4% and **Old Nick** 7.2%, usually only seen in bottles are now available in cask form. Amongst the pubs featuring these ales will be the Traveller's Jov. the Buddle, King Harry's and the Portland Inn.

### Cider News

Paul Miller (aka The Ciderman) has revealed that the Isle of Wight is to get its very own cider brands. There is to be a grand pressing of the first batch of apples at

Brickfield Horse Centre with power provided by a shire horse. There will be two resulting ciders: Brickfield Cider and Red Squirrel Cider. If you would like to watch the process, it will take place on 22nd, 23rd and 24th October. There will be a cider bar on the Saturday. ### The Buddle Inn, Niton

We are pleased to report that the Buddle has had a bumper season under new landlord and landlady, **John and Fiona Page**.



John originally comes from London and has a background in engineering. He moved to the Isle of Wight 25 years ago where he met Island girl Fiona.

About 8 years ago they took their first pub The Cornish Arms in St Meryn, Cornwall followed by the Pheasant Inn, near Wookey in Somerset.

Eventually the lure of the Isle of Wight got the better of them, and on 18<sup>th</sup> April this

year they moved back to the Island and

took over the historic Buddle Inn. (The Buddle is one of the Island's earliest hostelries, and for many years was also run as a farm. It was granted its first license in 1850.)


John is a real ale enthusiast and ensures that there are always plenty of good real ales on offer (plus one real cider). Yates' Buddle Best is frequently available as well as offerings from Goddards and Ventnor Brewery.

Food is available every lunchtime and 6-9 in the evenings. By the end of September there will be a new a la carte menu.


Live music is another feature of the Buddle. There are Jazz Nights, regular Friday Folk Nights with Allan Ramsdale-Capper and every Sunday lunchtime you can hear Brad Thomas play the piano.

Many an Islander over a certain age will remember being brought to see the mini model village in front of the pub. Sadly, this has become rather neglected over the years but John and Fiona are hoping that with a little help from the locals, it will soon be restored to its former glory.

If you fancy a cosy pint as the winter evenings draw in, the Buddle will have real open fires to warm you up (and if that doesn't work, ask about the hot "egg flip"!). John and Fiona would like to point out that the Buddle is a "dog-friendly" pub.

Across the harbour is the other pub in Tobermory, which should not be missed. The Mishnish is in the large yellow painted waterfront building near the ferry terminal. Busy and atmospheric it has lots of drinking areas, accommodation, food and two handpumps. Whilst we were there **Waggledance** and **Deuchars** were available.

Leaving Mull the small 18 car ferry takes you in 30 minutes across the Sound of Mull to the remote and isolated Ardnamurchan (Ard-nah-<u>murr-</u>c'n) Peninsula, the most westerly part of Great Britain. Here settlements are few and handpumps fewer. In fact we only found one; at the friendly Ben View Hotel just outside Strontian. Here "**Three Sisters**" 4.2% from the Atlas Brewery in Kinlochleven was on offer.



# What's the story in Balamory?.....

### A new brewery!

Readers with young children will probably be familiar with Balamory, the Scottish seaside village in the TV programmes. You may be aware that it is a real place, Tobermory on the Isle of Mull; now it has real ale as well!



Don't mention it in front of the chil-

dren, but the village has acquired its own brewery. It's in an ideal location too, overlooking the harbour and sandwiched between the Tobermory Distillery and MacCochan's Bar.


The small distillery, squashed between the cliffs and the harbourside has a shop and visitor centre. Also tours are arranged with the opportunity to sample the interesting single malts crafted here.

Next door is the new brewery set up by The Isle of Mull Brewing Company, opened for business in May this year, at which time they were producing two

ales. The stronger "Golden Galleon" at 5.5% is a pale and powerful ale named after the Spanish ship which blew up in mysterious circumstances in Tobermory harbour in 1588.

The weaker beer, "McCaig's Folly" 4.2% is a darkish bitter but with a light taste. As well as selling locally it is hoped to market the beers on the mainland; the folly in the name is the circular monument overlooking the nearby town of Oban.

Next door again is the lively and modern MacCochan's Bar, owned by the brewery, where both ales can be sampled.



### The Rookley Inn, Rookley Country Park

The new man in charge here is Steve Cunningham.

Up until very recently Steve was a London Cabbie. But coping with what Steve refers to as the Rat Race, became more and more unattractive. As a regular visitor to the Island to stay with his sister, Steve realised that life is so much better here on the Island and one day decided to emigrate.

Steve began work on the Island as a barman/cellarman at the Rookley Inn under the guidance of the then landlord Jeff Ledicott.

When Jeff left, Steve took over - and what a splendid job


