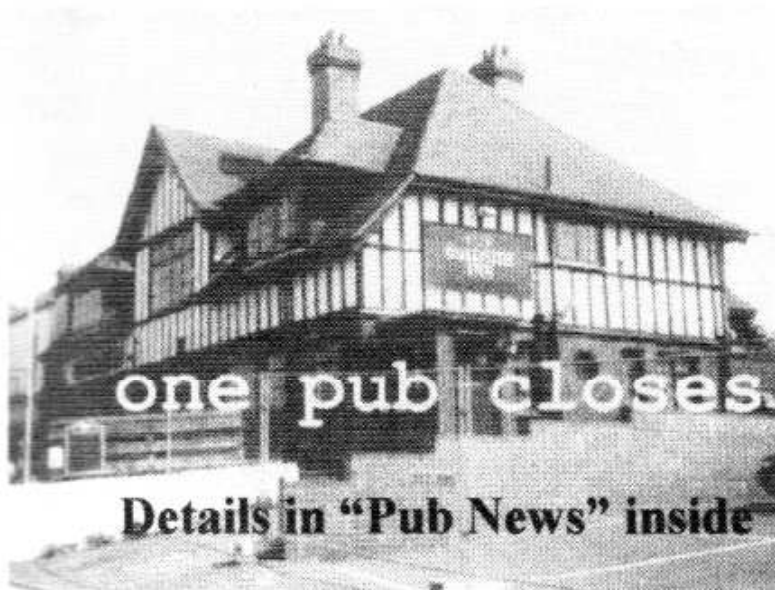

Goddard's New Head Brewer

Chris Coleman is reportedly "quietly tickled pink" at equalling his predecessor Jonathan Stancill's achievement of winning a Bronze for **Goddards Special Bitter** at this year **Great British Beer Festival**. Well done Chris!



Goddards are about to launch the first of a regular series of seasonal beers at the IW Steam Railway. Joining **Winter Warmer** (5.2% November to February) and **Inspiration** (March and April) will be **Iron Horse** (4.8% "a lightly hopped dark beer" normally released in September), **Duck's Folly*** (5.2% "a pale, strong bitter" normally released in October) and **Ale of Wight** (4% using the "wonderfully floral" liberty hops - May and June).

On August 9th **Goddards** took over **The Wishing Well**, Pondwell, their first pub. They hope to have 6 by 2005. It will stock the full range of Goddards products plus one "Ale of the Month".

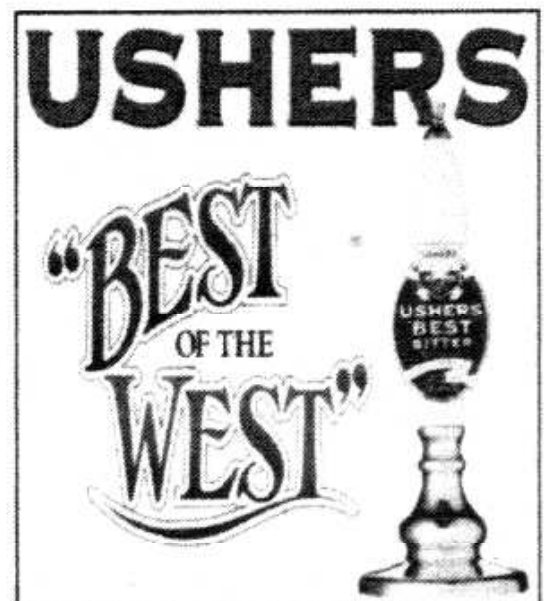

MORE BREWERY NEWS - - - - -



A Pub Valuer Remembers.....

For me, real ale conjures up memories of pubs back in the 1950's. Most of the pubs on the Island were owned by the **Mew Langton Brewery** under the authoritarian rule of Lennie and Francis Mew. Pubs were very basic affairs, often with outside toilets and facilities for ladies were rare. Food in the bar was virtually unknown and it was believed that one landlord refused to stock crisps as they caused the beer to go flat. One of my earliest recollections of Island pubs is visiting The Chequers Inn in Rookley.

The Chequers, now a thriving pub/restaurant was tenanted after the war by 2 elderly ladies. As young men we sat at benches by scrubbed deal tables whilst one of the ladies disappeared to the rear of the premises. She would return with an enamel jug from which she dispensed, in our case, half pints of beer.

Some years later, as part of my business, I visited the Chequers as a pub valuer. In those days the practice was for the vendor's valuer and the purchaser's valuer initially to agree a figure for fixtures and fittings. On the day of the change over, after adjustments had been made for stock and breakables, the transaction would take place in cash. Inventories were usually under £1000 and with stock only a few hundred, a £50 fee was well appreciated. This rather insecure system was later replaced with certified bankers draft and valuers cheques

Then came the changes: Island pubs in a succession of takeovers, were bounced between Brickwoods, Strongs and Whitbread. Inventories ballooned. Major improvements were carried out and although comfort became the norm, valuations were the subject of intense, often arbitrary negotiation and the writer thankfully retired in 1987.

Princess Royal, Newport have just won the "Wight in Bloom" Chairman's Cup by winning their own category and going on to beat the winners of all the other categories.

On 24th August, landlady Coral McDougal will travel to Trowbridge to see how the pub has fared against all the rest of the Usher's pubs. Find out how she got on in next issue of *Wightwash*.

New landlords of the **Arreton Barn**, Jane and William Brown will be holding a mini beer festival between 29th September and 3rd October. They will be increasing their usual 4 real ales to 9 plus 1 real cider. The festival will feature live music, a raffle and a special menu. As usual, parents can leave the kids for a couple of hours in the Mega Maise under the supervision of NNEB and NVQ qualified minders. The Mega Maise boasts the 5th largest slide in the country!

The **Hole in the Wall**, Ryde soon to revert to it's former p.a.e Hartridge name of **The Railway** (for a while the poor old pub had to suffer the indignity of being **The Cask and Cucumber**). Landlord Dennis Meek will be holding a beer festival in October. *Date yet to be finalized.*

Forget the US Masters, the hotly contested Rookley Open held on 25th July at Rookley Country Park held as a fund raiser for the Earl Mountbatten Hospice was won by Mark Crutcher. Organiser, Jeff Ledicott landlord of the **Rookley Inn** entered in to the spirit of the occasion and offered pints of Abbot and Champion for £1. Stand by for the **Autumn Classic!**

Jeff is planning a special Firework Celebration Weekend on 6th / 7th November with 10 to 12 real ales in a marquee, morris-men on the Saturday night, and The Unity Stompers on the Sunday lunchtime and of course, fireworks.

Spyglass landlords, Neil and Steph Gibbs have joined forces with Andrew Gibbs and Jane Simmonds to open the **Bargeman's Rest** in Newport (see photo on cover). Already extremely popular, the pub features at least 5 real ales (no gas or aspirators.!) and live music 5/6 nights a week. Bands will include: The Unity Stompers, Last Orders, Hoggy and the Sharpetones and The Chale Whalers.

Tim Saul landlord of the **Volunteer** and **The Blenheim** reports that Ventnor's annual beer festival will be held from Friday 22nd October to Sunday 7th November. Theme yet to be decided.

Tim is also running a brewery trip to Ringwoods on 6th October, price £18. Details from Tim on 852537.

Volunteer customers are well on their way to their target of raising £1,000 for the Royal National Mission to Deep Sea Fishermen. Last year pub regular Geoff Gardener was lost at sea.

There will be barbeques at the **Volunteer** on the evenings of the Carnival processions.

North Bucks CAMRA member Brian Bell has bought **The Falcon** in Ryde from Gales. The pub is scheduled to be closed from 31st August to 17th September for a £40,000 refit. When it reopens as a Free House it will stock Bass, Banks and Taylor's Shepherd Bitter, Goddards Special Bitter and Fuggle De Dum plus guest beers. Brian's previous pub, The Bridge Inn at Feeny Stratford, Milton Keynes, which was the meeting house of the North Bucks branch, has been sold to Punch Taverns. Brian is no stranger to the Isle of Wight; between 84/85 he managed The Travellers Joy for Memory Inns.

The Sun at Hulverstone remains closed.



At the public enquiry held during March at the Wiberforce Hall in Brighstone owner, Simon Bolt's appeal was turned down effectively banning him from using the ground floor for residential purposes or selling the pub as a private residence. CAMRA's Regional Director Marcus Stanley provided evidence to show that Mr. Bolt made no real attempt to run the pub as viable financial proposition. Several locals have shown interest in buying the pub if, and when it is put back on the market.

Grand celebrations are planned for the renaming of the **Cask and Custardpot** when it becomes once again The Stag, in fact **The Old Stag**. The local residents are delighted. They were so enraged when Hartridge boss (Sir) Geoffrey gave the well loved pub it's bizarre name that they raised a 500 name petition. The renaming will take place sometime during 21st 22nd August. During the weekend customers will be able to buy a £5.00 voucher entitling them to 5 pints of beer. There will be 7 or 8 real ales available in a specially erected beer marquee. Live music will be provided on Saturday night by Irish folk band The Wither Skinners and Sunday lunchtime Jack Tait's Henry's Pocket Jazz Band. Limited edition tankards and polo shirts will be on sale; and for those that want food, they can choose from a special "Game and Countryside menu" featuring dishes such as Venison Pie and Boar Steaks. In future, Ushers are allowing landlord Paul Holt to stock two regular guest beers on top of his two Ushers "in house" beers. Well done Ushers!

Edgar Nieghorn of the **Blacksmiths Arms** is expecting visitors from all over England during his unique **OCTOBERFEST** featuring all 6 genuine "Ocoberfest beers" brewed specifically in Munich for the world famous German Beer Festival Also on offer will be a comprehensive menu of German dishes. Edgar his holding his event between 1-10 October

The future of the **Roadside Inn** in Nettlestone is still in the balance. Although an application to turn the village pub into a residential property has been



made by the owners, it is still hoped that a deal can be made with a consortium of locals. A sticking point seems to be the separate sale of the car park.

Yet in the 1970's there was no real ale in the district. The only choice of bitters was Whitbread Tankard or Whitbread Trophy, both keg beers.

Sometimes things do change for the better!

But this particular change was no accident. It was principally due to the efforts of one organisation. The most effective pressure group Europe had seen - **CAMRA**. The Campaign for Real Ale. Us. The lot with beards and sandals and fat bellies and endless droning on about specific gravity and hop backs and the like. Sometimes I think we deserve a little pat on the back..

This however, is not a time for complacency. Granted there may be some that like drinking something that tastes like a mixture of ditch water and shaving foam but most of us over a certain age know it's a fad. We've seen it before. We remember the craze for Mexican Lagers, Ice Beers and Alcopops. But when it's all over, will it be too late? There's no doubt it will be for some breweries.

Help stop this trend by supporting CAMRA.

2. Go down the pub and enjoy a pint of real ale;
3. Both.
