The staff were efficient and courteous; and The beer was GREAT




Branch chairman, John Nicholson (right) and former branch chairman (and award winning brewer) Chris Coleman compare notes.

It's good to see all three Island head brewers in the top three and with so few votes between them, proving, once again, how lucky we are to have so many great local beers available. Nice to see Oakleaf's Hole Hearted in there, too, for the first time.

The Pub of the Year is a Really Useful Exercise, as it gives all local CAMRA members a chance to show their appreciation of their favourite local pubs and beer. I find it disappointing, though, that only about a third of all local members take the opportunity to do so. Come on, you people! It only takes a minute or two to complete the voting slip, and the cost of a second class stamp to post it. We have so many wonderful pubs on the Island, in spite of the past efforts of Whitbread et al, and perhaps if more of you voted, we'd see a wider range of pubs getting a mention. Pubs like the excellent Prince of Wales at Freshwater, the Railway at Ryde, the Suns at Calbourne and Hulverstone – I could name plenty of others, but I think you get the point. So let's make next year a really high turnout – go for it!

Mike Hoar thought we would like to hear about some of the rather interesting environments he has been allowed to discover in the last few months by his generous employer IKEA.

Just before Christmas they thought I would like a week in the sun to brighten up the winter months so I departed for 6 days in sunny (despite the monsoon) Bangkok.

IKEA being a very 'thrifty' company provided accommodation in the Novotel Lotus (economy) hotel at very reasonable rates. What they did not know was that this location was destined to lower my efficiency level considerably as on the street corner opposite the hotel lies the London Pride tavern (or name rather similar). This eminent establishment brews a range of 'English style' beers, served in an atmosphere which is decidedly British if somewhat exotic as regards the various languages to be heard. Over the course of several evenings I managed to partake of several pints of something which was very reminiscent of a well known Fuller's beer. None of the samples I imbibed were other than excellent, they also did a very reasonable, hoppy IPA. IPAs seem to be popular in Asia, they also had them in the micros in Singapore and the pub in Hi Chi Minh. (MS spelling checker thinks it should be happy not hoppy!).

Last week I had the pleasure to visit Warsaw – again 6 days. This time I was kept quite busy and the weather was not an invitation to exploration. However on the last night it cleared up a bit, only -5C so I went exploring with a very nice Vietnamese girl from our Product design department, Within a couple of hundred meters of the hotel we found a pub/restaurant called SOMO. 3 large bars and 2 large restaurants on 2 floors. Half the ground floor was covered in brewing apparatus. I had, once more, an IPA to wash down the very good beef tenderloin and followed it up with a dark porter ginger beer. This was hoppy with a slight chocolate taste and then a very slight after taste of ginger. They had no information regarding the strength, but after considering the erratic nature of the walk back to the hotel I think it was probably up around the 7% mark.

One bit of bad news that affected my beer tasting and enjoyment thereof is that I was diagnosed to have type 2 diabetes just before Christmas. However as times go by I find it is having less and less affect, I am supposed to drink in 'moderation' and to make sure I eat at the same time – well that's not so bad. The other advice was not to drink the low-alcohol beers as these have too high a sugar content. So now we know high alcohol beers are good for you.

II will be back in Warsaw for a couple of days in months time so I will see if they have any other 'pleasant surprises'.

The other interesting point was that they sold the beer in 50cl MARKED glasses with plenty of room for a head.

In the dark entrance one is confronted by a plate glass door which might be a risk but the room on the left and the bar area are quite unchanged which cancels out any adverse comments. A long divided Brasserie is on the right whilst on the left the public bar/games area is now also a long, divided seating area with a conserva-

tory style breakfast are behind the bar. All quite attractively done with some nice nautical touches which will bed in with time. The beer is still good but of the restricted Yarmouth range – it is a pity that more imagination cannot be introduced – after almost visitors will surely look for something more interesting such as can be found in nearly all Island watering holes.

### Dear Derek.

Your email has caused much interest in our family for several reasons:

- During 83/84 I visited Vanuatu several times working for P&O as a ship's musician.
