So what have we been up to?

Well **on a branch level** we've been pretty busy thinking about which pubs should go into next year's Good Beer Guide. Every year we have to come up with recommendations for this national publication, and it is no easy task. I don't have to tell you that we have dozens of really good pubs on the Island all serving up good real ale. Regrettably we are only allowed to recommend 22. This is how we do it :-

We start with a list of all the pubs in the area (the Island).

We chuck out all the ones that don't sell real ale.

That leaves us with around 100 pubs, *and this is where the trouble starts*! Over the course of several meetings, we whittle this number down to around 80 then 50 then 30 using the following criteria.

Quality of Beer etc This obviously has to be the most important single factor. The pub doesn't need to sell a wide range of beers. A pub selling a couple of ales in tip-top condition is infinitely preferable to one selling lots of variable quality. A common factor here is the temperature of beer. As mentioned in the last issue, a frequent complaint from members is that beers are either too cold or too warm.

Atmosphere/Style/Décor This is partly about the "feel" of the interior— is it a nice place to be? Pubs certainly don't have to be picture-postcard, unspoilt rural gems to score highly here. Estate pubs, town centre bars, back street boozers — all can be excellent in their own terms.

Service and Welcome Is the service prompt, efficient and friendly? Do you get full measure or at least a top up without having to ask? Does the person serving you seem to regard you as a human being rather than just a source of revenue?

Clientele Mix A good pub is one where anyone can go in and feel comfortable, whoever they are.

Sympathy With CAMRA Aims Does the pub espouse and promote our values? Is cask beer given a positive push here? Is information offered about the ales sold?

Good Value This is about value for money, but in the widest sense of the term i.e. not just how cheap the ale is.

By now we have probably decided on the 10 or so "must include" pubs, but what about the remaining 12 This is when the hit squads come in to their own. This year 3 teams of CAMRA members will visit a list of pubs outside their normal drinking areas and report back.

The results will be discussed at a final meeting at the Fat Cat on

Can you tell me what has happened to the sportsman's rest at Porchfield. It was a place I knew well as a boy of 7 years old. or during the second world war and a few years later. I have been living in new Zealand for the last 40 years and I know how things have changed I would be more than happy to receive any information about the above pub.

I wrote back to Ray to tell him that the Sportsman's Rest is still going strong and received this reply...

Hi, it's Ray and Elaine again.

It was just out of this world to see a photo of the pub and to know it still is serving beer. My involvement with the sportsman's rest goes back to the 1940's. My mother and father would take the car out to the pub on a Saturday to have a drink and I would play with the local kids. I was only 5 years of age and it was the beginning of the 2nd world war. The landlords during the war were Stan and Minnie Cheeseman.

It was around this area that there were army encampments there for the build up of tanks and armoury that went on the great push to Normandy.

I remember that in those days the bus came through the village twice a week on a Tuesday and Thursday if you missed this bus you had to walk out to the main Yarmouth road, I remember it well as my aunty had to march me there and I was

not at all a very popular little boy. I do remember one thing which could be on film, It happened after the war around the 1950's. My parents owned the Falcon Inn in Castle Road, where we used to have an old chap come in every night for a pint before he went home to bed (you see he walked to work and back every day which would have been around 10 miles) the old chaps name was Charlie Fallack. In Porchfield going into the sportsmans rest

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CAMRA Regional Meetings


Don't we all love meetings? Well as meetings go CAMRA Regional meetings are better than most. You get to try some choice ale at hand picked pubs round the country, in the company of other ale enthusiasts. OK, so there is business to be done, but that way you find out what other branches are up to, and what's going on in the pub and brewing business in the rest of the country.

The meetings are held quarterly, and the Weyhill Fair, the Salisbury Village Freehouse, the Queens Hotel, Gosport, and the Boot at Weymouth have been recent destinations. At the Boot we met Giles Smeaton of Dorset Brewery. He told us about SIBA which represents 380 small brewers, and about their relationship with the 'pubcos' which are sweeping the land (and the Island) and posing a threat to choice and diversity of beers.

The latest meeting was at the Shanklin Conservative Club, an outlet for fine beers including Ventnor Brewery (and for Burts before that!) and a previous Island nominee for Club of the Year (COTY) award. CAMRA National Executive

member John Holland was present, and talked about this competition, which he organises.

The hot topic was the CAMRA method for its choice at the Great British Beer Festival of Champion Beer of Britain (CBOB). As you know from the previous Wightwash, Dave Yates deservedly won a bronze award for Yates' Special Draft. However the choice of Green King IPA as champion bitter had raised some eyebrows. Other matters were Brewery reports, Pub chains, branch reports, and a report on the success of 'The Ciderman' the local company supplying our pubs with cider from four different English Counties. Well that brought the meeting to and end, but not the beer session, which continued at the Solent Inn in Ryde. Alex Lawson





The Palmer Memorial

Visitors to Bembridge will have seen this ornate memorial which stands by the roadside at the end of the embankment. The symbolism in the sculpture is reinforced by the inscription which tells of the local vicar whose life is commemorated here. John Palmer, vicar of Bembridge who died in 1896 was a popular incumbent of the village. His claim to fame and no doubt, source of the funding for this remarkable memorial is due to his official duties as Chaplain to the Grand Masonic Lodge of Great Britain.



Webster he was a sitting member of parliament for the Island and he owned the company responsible for the modernisation of Sandown Pier. Rising through the ranks he was at one time Attorney General and later the Lord Chief Justice.



The memorial was dedicated at a ceremony conducted by Lord Alverstone who was the Lord Chief Justice of Great Britain. He was acting in his official capacity as the Grand Master of the Central Masonic Lodge. Lord Alverstone had long connections with the Island. In his younger days, as Richard

Arreton's Scarecrow Brewery is ticking over quite nicely. Bottles of Scarecrow bit-

ter are on hand at the Arreton Barn Bottle Shop and also via hand pump at all Gibbs's pubs.

Goddards Brewery have managed to produce their 500th brew of **Goddards Special Bitter** – Head of Brewing **Chris Coleman** (who has probably drunk about 20% of it) told me that it was quite an accomplishment for a small independent brewery and a tribute to the beer and the staff past and present. A special Christmas brew will be available from 10th-31st

December. Christmas Orange (4.0% aby) is brewed along the same line as Special Bitter but a hint of natural orange and a

secret constituent to give it a bit of a sting (Holly?) has also been incorporated. Winter Warmer (5.2% abv) so that we can keep you bang up to date! is now available from outlets till February.

> Ale of Wight (4.0% abv) is now available in bottles so look out for it at TESCOS (probably) and your local now.

Badger Brewery recently ceased production of **Panda Pops**. This was a special

brew with a **zero% abv** specifically distilled for children in different colours that made them Hyper-active (unless they had the clear coloured one!), which doesn't affect us grown ups so it's pointless writing about it isn't it, but I've done it now so there!!

On the adult side of things Fursty Ferret went well in the summer. As the festive season draws near however it has been replaced it with a very fruity new ale by the name of **Festive Pheasant** (4.5% abv). This will be available from now until January (watch out for the feathers though!). From Dec 21st and for one month only **Slurpin** Snowman will be available. Details are a bit sketchy but I have been told that it's a mid-strength beer brewed by Eskimos! Mike Strand tells me that Andrew Gibbs is by now married. Mike took the opportunity to participate in his stag do, which started at The Dairyman's Daughter and finished at the Kings Head). 18 of them boarded a coach that took them to Ventnor. They were then taken to Yarmouth and they visited every pub on the way (18 by my calculation). At The Kings Head the party managed to down 140 pints of beer and ate 15 pasties, which were bought from a shop in the square as they couldn't smoke with a

He is adding to it a special Christmas beer - **Wight Christmas** (5.2% abv) a lighter coloured strong ale with a hint of liquorice and raisins.

So how did all this come about we wonder ? Perhaps Jack crossed on a ocean liner from New York to Southampton and then decided to come to the Island. So where were the recordings done ? Where did he play? Through the research that we carried out for our Isle of Wight Rock book we know that in

1957 there was skiffle music at the Wheatsheaf pub in Cowes featuring among others Cliff Maidment and the late Tom Taylor, but does anybody know about this ? Does any one recall seeing Ramblin' Jack ?

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Ramblin' Jack Elliott on the Isle of Wight

Recently, my Vaguely Sunny colleague Mike Plumbley unearthed a gem of a story regarding the American folk singer **Ramblin' Jack Elliott**. Ramblin' Jack is one of folk music's most enduring characters. Since he first came on the scene in the late 1950s he has influenced a whole host of musicians from Bob Dylan and Pete Seeger to the Rolling Stones and the Grateful Dead. The son of a New York doctor, he ran away from home at the age of eleven to join the rodeo. He later became a pivotal figure in folk music.

Ramblin' Jack was a protégé and a friend of Woody Guthrie. He went on to establish his own narrative style which was a great influence on his own protégé - Bob Dylan.

Amazingly, at the end of October on the Hi-Tone label two Ramblin' Jack Elliott CDs were released. The first is 'The Lost Topic Tapes - Cowes Harbour 1957'. The second is 'The Lost Topic Tapes - Isle of Wight 1957'.

Type in 'Ramblin' Jack Elliott Isle of Wight' on an internet search engine and you will discover several sources to order these two albums. The track listing for Cowes Harbour 1957 is Intro, Hard Travellin', Bick Rock Candy Mountain, Old Rattler, Talking Columbia Blues, Streets Of Laredo, Jack Of Diamonds, Rusty Jiggs & Sandy Sam, Tom Joad, Acres Of Clams, Freight Train, Chisholm Trail, Crawdad Song, Black Girl, Tom Dooley, Rocky Mountain Belle.
